Friends Annual Meeting of the Membership to be November 3

Video from September 8-9 programs will provide new perspectives

Friends will gather at the National Park Service Somerset office on Saturday, November 3 for the annual meeting of the membership. The 2 pm meeting will begin with a briefing from the National Park Service, including a discussion of next year's construction projects, and continue with a review of Friends' accomplishments over the past 12 months. A slate of candidates for the Board of Directors will be presented and voted upon.

A highlight of the meeting will be the opportunity to view video highlights of the four *Learning Center Without Walls* programs presented at the Memorial on September 8-9, 2012. These panel discussions, a new initiative sponsored by the Friends, featured journalists, FBI agents, teachers, and Capitol employees reflecting on their 9/11 experiences.

"The annual and mid-year meetings are important opportunities for the Friends to get to know one another and the NPS staff, stay informed about the park, and generate ideas and energy for the new year ahead," Board Secretary Donna Glessner said. "I hope the meeting room will be overflowing with Friends."

The NPS office is located at 109 West Main Street in Somerset. Metered parking is available at the rear of the building on Patriot Street. This gathering follows the quarterly public meeting of the Flight 93 Advisory Commission held at the same location from 10 am to 1 pm.

All are welcome to attend the Friends' annual meeting, and members who have paid dues for the 2013 program year before October 22 will be eligible to vote for the Board of Directors. Friends offer trip to National 9/11 Memorial in NYC

The Friends of Flight 93 National Memorial is sponsoring a one-day motor coach trip to Lower Manhattan on Saturday, November 10 to visit the National 9/11 Memorial, the 9/11 Tribute Center and other sites related to September 11, 2001. The trip, open to members of the Friends, Flight 93 Ambassadors and volunteers, and the staff of Flight 93 National Memorial, has sold out.

The trip itinerary includes a tour of the 9/11 Tribute Center and a walking tour of Ground Zero led by a guide who either experienced the loss of a loved one at Ground Zero, survived or responded to the Towers, or lived in Lower Manhattan on 9/11. The tour will conclude at the new National 9/11 Memorial on the site of

the World Trade Center Towers. A highlight of the Friends' visit to the 9/11 Memorial will be viewing the names of the forty passengers and crew of Flight 93 engraved on the bronze parapet of the South Memorial Pool.

Friends will also have an opportunity to visit St. Paul's Chapel, known as "The Little Chapel That Stood" because of its proximity to the Towers and role as a place of respite for

rescue and recovery workers. The self-guided tour of the Chapel provides a glimpse of the massive and sustained relief effort at Ground Zero. Several other 9/11-related points of interest in Lower Manhattan are located within easy walking distance and Friends will enjoy some free time to explore the city on foot or by public transit.

For many volunteers, the trip will be a time to renew friendships with Tribute Center docents who have visited Flight 93 National Memorial in the past.

Reflections on the Luminaria Ceremony, September 10, 2012

We were honored to carry lanterns to the Wall of Names on the evening of September 10. Forty people with forty lanterns, spaced out evenly, carried silently and respectfully on the long walk along the black wall to the white wall against a fading sunset. Forty people, alive. Forty heroes who fought back eleven years ago.

One of us was near the front, one near the rear. Each step, for both of us, was a step into the souls of the people we were there to honor and pay our respects to, on behalf of both ourselves and the nation that created this memorial in their behalf. On our left was their burial ground. On the right, the hope of the landscape, being reclaimed for the living, especially their families, but also for the rest of us.

In the line were people from town, the surrounding countryside, the families, afar, all carrying the spark of one life given for all of us. Near the end of the line, looking forward at the points of light ahead, Bobbie felt deep comfort. For us both it was a comfort to be one of many together bearing the lanterns, personally representing one of our heroes, silently saying thank you. We felt great honor to be included in a unique tradition aborning.

At the wall, as we turned the corner, people, people like all of us, who had come in respect and with love. Both Bobbie and I felt the embrace of those people as they came into our view, as we silently set our lanterns to light each panel, each person, as we

touched their names on the wall, then turning away and becoming a part of the people, "We the People."

Later, in the dark with the stars sparkling overhead, we returned in silence, picked up our lanterns, and said thank you again and farewell, knowing we and others will always return to pay homage individually and as a nation again and again.

Although it felt sad, we did not feel burdened. It felt right, morally right.

USS Somerset crest proclaims "Courage Through Adversity'

Many Friends had the opportunity to meet Commander Cole Hayes of the newly-christened USS Somerset when he visited the Memorial on September 10-11. The USS Somerset is the third of three new naval vessels named in memory of the September 11 terrorist attacks.

Hayes explained that the passengers and crew of Flight 93 will be honored in many ways on *The Somerset*, including photos and biographies of the forty hanging in the passageways used by the men and women on board, in items placed beneath the ship's mast, and in the Coat of Arms that reflects the ship's heritage.

As Commander Hayes shared, each device and color in the ship's Coat of Arms has a meaning which contributes to the commemoration of Flight 93. This symbolism is explained at http://www.tioh.hqda.pentagon.mil/Heraldry/Navy/NavalShip.aspx?u=8523. Walter Huber, a new member of the Friends, shared this description of the Coat of Arms, translating the specialized language of heraldry into everyday English.

USS Somerset (LPD 25) Coat of Arms

SHIELD (the larger device, with four crossed swords behind it)

The shape of the shield is based on the shield on the seal of Somerset County, Pennsylvania. The border of the shield has forty stars, one for each of the passengers and crew. There are nine, lightblue, wedge-shaped segments in the sky, and three, similar, lightgreen segments in the grass, signifying the number 93. The five trees represent the plantings at Flight 93 National Memorial and also signify that this is the fifth ship to bear the name "Somerset". Above the trees is a bald eagle flying toward the left (sinister direction), but bending to the right to show that the passengers and crew turned the flight of the airliner and bravely changed the



outcome from the terrorists' intent. The four swords are Navy and Marine Corps officer swords and the Navy cutlass and the Marine Corps noncommissioned officer sword, representing the officers, crew, and embarked Marines of the USS Somerset.

CREST (the smaller device, shaped like the keystone)

The keystone frame is symbolic of Pennsylvania, known as the Keystone State. The image shows the USS United States, the first ship of the United States Navy, built and launched in Philadelphia in 1797. The cornstalk and the olive branch were taken from the Pennsylvania state seal.

MOTTO (lettered on red ribbon)

"Virtus per adversa" translates to "Courage Through Adversity".



The Learning Center Without Walls


New educational initiative sponsored by the Friends

Four hours of insightful educational programming took place inside a wind-buffeted tent at the location of the future Visitor Center, reaching several hundred Memorial visitors on September 8-9. Because the programs were also videotaped, the sessions will be used for staff and volunteer training and thousands more will be able to view them at the park website.

The concept of inviting panelists to present at the Memorial on the weekend prior to September 11 came from discussions among the NPS, the Families, and the Friends of Flight 93 about the public's interest in learning more about Flight 93 and the broader context of the 9/11 attacks. The team identified four diverse topics to present, invited speakers from around the country, developed exhibits to complement each subject, and welcomed the public to experience the type of programming which will one day be offered at the "bricks-and-mortar" version of the Learning Center.

The Friends acknowledge Blueland Media, LG Electronics, the National Park Foundation, and James Ferris, videographer, for their generous donations. The sessions were moderated by Superintendent Jeff Reinbold.

Mission accomplished: 1,875 flags flown in 2012

The Friends have completed their 2012 commitment to fly 1,875 flags over Flight 93 National Memorial in support of the National Park Foundation's fundraising campaign. Over the past four months fifty-five Friends (and friends of *Friends*) flew the flags, logging 110 hours of volunteer time. Volunteers ranged in age from 11 to 77 years old. At the end of this, their third year of flying flags for the campaign, the Friends have flown a total of 4,250 flags.

The 3' x 5' flags are available for a minimum donation of \$93 and \$7 for shipping and handling fees, for a total of \$100 per flag. The flag will come with a certificate of authenticity.


